Training team triumph

JOHN Forrest Secondary College's partnership with training organisation MPA Skills has been recognised as one of the best in Australia.

It has won the Federal Government's 2011 Australian Training Award for the school pathway to Vocational and Educational Training program in Australia.

The award, presented at the Brisbane Convention Centre on November 25, is recognition of the opportunities being offered to students through the John Forrest Trade Training Centre.

According to John Forrest Principal Di Turner, the partnership provides students with a continuous pathway from school to full-time employment.

"Through programs, students begin the first stage of a mapped and highly supportive lifecycle for employment that begins with the integration of the school-based pre-apprenticeship and school-based apprenticeship training programs within the senior school curriculum," she said.

"The pathway continues through to potential employment by MPA Skills as full-time apprentices on

completion of Year 12 or in lieu of finishing secondary schooling.

"As employees of MPA Skills, students remain in the supportive and nurturing MPA Skills environment and have ongoing access to training expertise, industry mentors, and the huge range of employers and tradespeople who form the MPA membership.

"The students are constantly supported, and the skills they learn from their MPA mentors will stay with them for life."

In 2011, 15 plumbing pre-apprentices, eight painting and decorating school-based apprentices and 260 try-a-trade students have been in the MPA in the college's Trade Training Centre, and Mrs Turner said she anticipated an increase in enrolments next year.

"At this stage we anticipate there will be a waiting list for all programs," she said. "The demand from students is huge, and I think that is the best indicator of the success of the partnership."

MPA Group CEO Murray Thomas said the painting and decorating and plumbing and gasfitting programs on offer were all designed to address industry shortages.
